THE ADAGE "good things come in small packages" is so appropriate!

Ann Gudas has been with the Society of the Little Flower for 36 years. A dedicated and conscientious worker, Annie, as we all call her, worked in many facets of the Society. She started just as the Society was moving from Roseland to its present location in Darien, Illinois, in 1984. She helped us move in. She started on the telephones, then moved into the Fulfillment Department, where we respond to people's requests. As a meticulous person with beautiful handwriting, she wrote out all the personalized Mass cards. Her great attention to detail kept mistakes to a minimum, which is so important.

Eventually, with her conscientious nature, excellent organizational skills, and attention to detail, Annie moved to data entry, where she worked until her retirement in August of this year.

Asked if she got bored doing the same thing, Annie, lights up and explains: "It was never a job. We are a family here. We take care of each other. The Society certainly became my extended family away from home. I felt cared for and respected."

Why did you stay so long here? "The unwavering faith of our donors, St. Thérèse's friends, inspired me. Reading their letters and listening to their deep faith and trust really inspired me. I enjoyed every day. It was never a job – it felt more like a Church. Religious faith permeates the Society and our interaction with donors and friends.

"And St. Thérèse! She is amazing. She brings people close to Jesus. They love God through her. They count on her intercession. She is like a 'security blanket' for many people, and in these days, we need security of heavenly friends.

"I so enjoyed the people I worked with. We got along well and supported each other. We had some fun times. The annual 'white elephant' Christmas party was so much fun. > Besides her regular responsibilities, Annie took personal interest in the dining room. She cleaned it every morning and several times a day. She came in early (to avoid driving home in the darkness) and always had coffee brewing when we came to work – and throughout the day.

Her spirit of dedication and caring permeated the office. She will be deeply missed (and not just in the morning

when people are looking for coffee).

'WHAT HAPPENED TO FATHER BOB?'

UR BELOVED FRIEND St. Thérèse of Lisieux beautifully talks of the seasons of nature being a reflection of the seasons of God's love affair with us. I love reflecting on this powerful image – and I believe it is true. Experiencing God in nature, as it affirms and confirms our being with and in God, is an area I've been drawn to in prayer. Nature speaks and reveals a profound truth as we watch, listen, participate, and are embraced by her! I've learned some profound lessons from being out in nature.

Of course, we all react differently to the different seasons and transition. I actually enjoy the cold of winter – time for cuddling and keeping warm. I grew up in a northern climate. As an overheated Sicilian, I'm always hot and keep windows open to enjoy the crisp, cold air. Spring is always a time to watch seeming death give way to new life re-emerging. The flowers peek through, the buds emerge, and leaves reappear to bring hope. Summer is welcomed as a vibrant time of warmth, relaxation and beauty – although when it gets too hot and sweaty, as it did this past summer, it is oppressive. Fall is always beautiful, as the leaves transform and the vibrant colors delight. The weather here in the Midwest is awesome and so comfortable. But then the leaves fall to the ground. And sunshine is shorter, nights longer.

We are to embrace it all. I've lived a rich and wonderful life. God has been good to me in so many ways. I've tried to make a difference in the 59 years as a Carmelite religious and 52 years as a priest. The Carmelites have trusted me with many different responsibilities and ministries. I've tried to give my best and empower others to work as teams to fulfill our Gospel and baptismal mission. Like you, life has had its ups and downs and challenges, but I must say that the lows were few and the wonders were many. So many people have touched my life, challenged and activated my gifts. I've been blessed by the good Carmelites I have lived with and the people I have worked with and served. They have mostly been an inspiration. In fact, I've probably enjoyed the ride too much. God has been so good.

So it was a shock when I was suddenly asked to retire as Director of the Society of the Little Flower. A succession plan was in place involving very competent staff here. I know our Provincial's concern was that I was aging and had experienced some health setbacks in recent years. The future of the Society of the Little Flower is such an important priority. Another Carmelite, whom I did not know well, had been appointed to replace me. Fr. Thomas Schrader, I have learned, is a good man, with a good heart for St. Thérèse, a keen mind with new ideas and possibilities, and a deep desire to serve the mission of the Society and the Carmelites.

But I must admit that I did not accept the transition and decision well - it was like all the leaves fell off the trees at once. It began a dark night for me as I dealt with being mortal. There has always been an eternal child in me, approaching each day with enthusiasm and possibilities. So this transition has been a death and grieving experience for me, with stages of anger, resentment, darkness, forgiveness, and acceptance. As many of you know, growing old is not easy and surrender is tough, especially when I've been in charge of whatever ministry I was in since I was 33 years old. Fourty-four years of leadership responsibility spoiled me. I'm embarrassed to admit that the future looked bleak and I walked through some deep depression. I often looked to St. Thérèse, my longtime friend and boss, for help. I so identified with her intense dark night during those last 18 months of her life. God was leading me into a new season of trust again. Fr. Tom has been very sensitive to my situation. Mary Lambert, our Development Director, who has been my heart and support these many years, helped and challenged me to walk with hope.

The future looked dark because I was looking at myself and my pain, and not at God. But seasons continue to evolve into each other, and I'm now becoming comfortable. Fr. Tom invited me to stay in some capacity to help continue relationships built over many years. That has eased my transition. I will continue to serve as Director of the Carmelite Spiritual Center, as well as help with pilgrimages to the new National Shrine and Museum of St. Thérèse here on campus. I'm thrilled with the possibility of remaining in touch with many of you who inspired me these last 28 years of service. Your faith, devotion, and generosity brightened every day for me.

I'm incredibly grateful to the Carmelites who allowed and empowered me to serve in this privileged capacity for 28 years.

I'm incredibly grateful to St. Thérèse who taught and inspired me so much. She has been a good friend! Please pray for me as I enter this new season of life – there are new possibilities and surprises here. I hold you close in my heart and prayer.

God bless you and may Thérèse continue to smile on you!

Some people think they are lost in the vast universe of humanity – as if God is too busy to notice, empower and pay attention to them. God is not that small and limited! While God's all-knowing presence and grandeur embrace everyone and everything, God also pays personal attention to each person. God is so vast; He is beyond our understanding.

We are never to shrink God, as if our Triune God has the limited capacity of the human heart and brain. The awesome vastness of God's personal presence is breath-taking and beyond our imagining. Only in faith can we accept and appreciate this divine reality, even though we don't comprehend it. We are not alone! God is always with us and within us, paying personal attention. Don't we remember Jesus saying: "I am always with you"? Jesus is Emmanuel – "God with us!"

Let me help explain ways in which you are making a difference in many people's lives as Friends of St. Thérèse and the Carmelites.

You know the Little Flower dedicated her life as a Carmelite Cloistered Nun to pray for priests to serve the Church. She had been scandalized by some of the clericalism she experienced when her Dad took her to Rome and she made her appeal to the Pope to enter Carmel. This moved her to help priests to be faithful to their ordination call to humbly serve people – like Jesus – by washing feet and not being taken up with power, prestige, and position. You can see this in her letters to Maurice, the young seminarian she wrote to as he became a missionary priest.

You and I live in a Church today that has been shaken by clerical abuse and hierarchial mismanagement. We are called to trust that Jesus is reforming our Church – and wants us to be holy, just, and honest people. He wants us to have priests and bishops as humble servants and companions. The Carmelites share St. Thérèse's concern.

You would be proud of the 56 young men the Carmelite Province of the Most Pure Heart of Mary have in formation. You support their education and formation. We make sure these men are committed to serving God and God's people, and not become "selfreferential and self-serving," as Pope Francis challenges us. These young men in formation in our Province are from Canada, El Salvador, Mexico, Peru, and the United States. They impress all of us with their commitment to lives of holiness and service, especially to the poor. Some of the work we Carmelites do to empower people to become selfsufficient, to experience their dignity as God's beloved, to work for justice and inclusivity, must make your heart proud. You have invested in us. You are making a huge difference in these

young men's lives. They know you are challenging them to make a Gospel difference in the places they now serve or will serve.

We are making a significant difference in the lives, culture, environment, Church, and economy where we serve. The young men in formation in our many Carmelite provinces throughout the world, numbering more than 300 men, are in the same process. They are committed to a Church of service, holiness, and justice. And you are making this possible by your prayers and financial support. God is working wonders though you.

Besides the young men in Carmelite formation, you are making a huge difference in helping us take care of our senior Carmelites who poured out their lives in service.

Our Province also serves and inspires thousands of young people in seven Catholic high schools. The students are challenged not only to grow in knowledge and faith, but also to serve their communities as a constitutive element of Catholic identity and faith. The universal outreach of God is critical to our identity as a Catholic, Christian people. The seven high schools of our Carmelite Province are in Tucson, Arizona; Encino, California; Lima, Peru; and Chicago, Joliet, and Mundelein in Illinois. These young people, because of the support we are able to give because of you, move on in life with a deeper sense of their Catholic identity as beloved of God, but also of their responsibility to make a difference in our world. St. Thérèse's mission was "to make God known and loved to the ends of the earth." You are helping to make this happen through the people you are supporting as faith-filled and generous members of the Society of the little Flower.

You have supported the Carmelites in parishes around the U.S. and Canada, as well as our missions. Because you educate and inspire us, we are able to open the Word of God and celebrate Eucharist, helping people understand and embrace the Presence of God in their daily lives. As hospital and prison chaplains, pastoral counselors, and spiritual guides, Carmelites continue to walk with people, opening them to the powerful Presence of God and how to make a significant difference in announcing the kingdom of God in our world.

Another way you are making a difference is through our Carmelite Spiritual Centers. Our Carmelite charism in the Church is to teach people to live in God's Presence; to pray more contemplatively; to understand, as St. Thérèse so powerfully teaches us, that "everything is grace." God is present and involved in every detail and experience of our lives. We need to be alert and wakened to the Divine Presence. Our centers invite people to take time away to listen to God and deepen our awareness of God's Presence and activity in our lives. Our Carmelite Province supports Spiritual Centers in Darien, Illinois; Niagara Falls, Ontario; Lurin, Peru; and Scipio, Kansas. Programs of spirituality are hosted and offered. Recently, we had several weeks of programs on Carmelite spirituality, focusing on St. Thérèse of Lisieux, St. Teresa of Avila, and St. John of the Cross. We invited people to deepen their understanding of the Divine Indwelling and how to cooperate with God, transforming us and our world.

Some comments from recent program participants:

• "Deeply touched by the messages given in presentations which were 'right on' to what we have to hear. We cannot hear enough that God is within us and is seeking us out because He loves us no matter what."

- "Great depth of knowledge and wisdom presented in a very understandable way."
- "I feel like Thérèse and Teresa are now real people for me ... before they were 'other worldly" and way beyond me.
- "You opened new vistas for me ... reintroduced me to a greater depth of the interior spiritual journey."
- "So encouraging that an interior life is attainable – received a deeper appreciation for Thérèse, Teresa, and John of the Cross, for which I am deeply grateful."

You have touched the lives of so many who you will never meet this side of heaven. Such is the reality of the Body of Christ in communion. Such is the Carmelite mission of St. Thérèse. Grace moving through us makes us more generous and generative, working for the justice of God's kingdom for everyone and sharing God's mercy with all.

We are all here to make a difference – in small and significant ways. St. Thérèse smiles on you, her friends, as she sees you fulfilling your baptismal mission and becoming her "Shower of Roses," glorifying God by making God's kingdom real in our world.

May gratitude and generosity continue to fill your heart, as God's Presence and love continue to make a big difference in your lives.

LITTLE FLOWER PRAYER CARDS AND MASS ENROLLMENT CARDS

When someone has a devotion to St. Thérèse, it is most often as a result of St. Thérèse touching their lives in some small or big way. Last year, I sat in my mother's home in eastern Newfoundland. looking through some of the Mass Cards my family received at the time of my brother's death in 1988. My mother has kept these cards for some 30 years! Mothers who have lost a child know why! It still brings her consolation. She has so many of the Society of the Little Flower Five-year Memorial Enrollment Mass Cards, Perpetual Memorial Enrollment Mass

Cards, and Living Mass Enrollment Intentions. I remember how much those cards meant to my parents, to know that their son would be perpetually remembered in Masses and prayers by the Carmelites. St. Thérèse's healing "Shower of Roses" has touched my mother and our family for many years.

I keep reminding people in our parish that when we use these cards, we are also assisting in the education and formation of our Carmelite seminarians. Every day, our Carmelite communities across North and South America, pray in thanksgiving for the friends of the Little Flower Society who continue to make a difference. At our parish

office in Niagara, these St. Thérèse Mass cards are still made available. and they are used in abundance by our parishioners. So many people come in asking for the Society of the Little Flower Mass Enrollment Cards. Every time a member or a family member of the Knights of Columbus passes away, you can be sure that a card will be presented to the family at the funeral home. Our Catholic Women's League always use the Society of the Little Flower Enrollment Cards to bring comfort to families after a death or to comfort someone during an illness. Thérèse's "Shower of Roses" continues to comfort so many people.
